Age was no barrier to 11-year-old Isabella Fraser-Corbridge, who beat off stiff competition from the older swimmers to win, finishing with an impressive butterfly display.

The younger novices continued to

show their potential. Livia Day (6) came away with a clutch of medals, taking gold in the backstroke and front crawl, and silver in the breaststroke and butterfly.

Beth Broad topped the podium in breaststroke and Emily Neil took first for the butterfly, with Lucy Jones and Eva Ferguson sharing the honours between them.

Beau Versey and William Maughan
(6) shared the golds in the six-year-old boys, with Beau winning both backstroke and front crawl, and William the breaststroke and butterfly.

Adam Sadlem and showman Luke Sweetnam were rewarded with silver and bronze medals.

Rhyseren Taylor (7) won all four of her events in impressive style, achieving a new club record for the 25m front crawl in just 20.79 seconds from a push off start.
